Because Jesus is the light of the world, his followers don't need to fear darkness or life's dark times. Make this nightlight to remind you of Jesus' light and presence.




What you need:

- Work area with good ventilation
- Mason jar
- Clear glue that works on glass
- Paintbrush
- Glass stones
- Tealight candle
- LighterAdult supervision

What you do:

- 1. Starting at the top of the jar, brush glue on a small section.
- 2. Press glass stones onto the glue in rows. Let dry.
- 3. Continue gluing stones, in small sections, until the entire jar is covered.
- 4. When dry, place a candle inside. Light with adult help.



THE TWELVE DAYS OF CHRISTMAS

In times of persecution, the festive song, *The Twelve Days of Christmas*, was used by courageous disciples to teach orthodox Christian faith to children and converts. While the world happily sang one tune, the faithful remembered their Lord:

My true love is God the Father.

The partridge in a pear tree is Jesus Christ.

Two turtle doves are the Old and New Testaments.

Three French hens stand for faith, hope and love.

Four calling birds are the four Gospels.

Five gold rings recall the first five books of the Old Testament, known as the TORAH (The Law).

Six geese a-laying stand for the six days of creation.

Seven swans a-swimming represent the sevenfold gifts of the Holy Spirit.

Eight maids a-milking are the eight Beatitudes within the Sermon on the Mount.

Nine ladies dancing are the nine fruits of the Holy Spirit listed in Galatians 5:22.

Ten lords a-leaping are the Ten Commandments.

Eleven pipers piping stand for the eleven faithful disciples.

Twelve drummers drumming stand for the 12 points of belief in the Apostles' Creed.





